First Reading Acts 6:1-7

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles They elected seven men filled with the Spirit and wisdom.

About this time, when the number of disciples was increasing, the Hellenists made a complaint against the Hebrews: in the daily distribution their own widows were being overlooked. So the Twelve called a full meeting of the disciples and addressed them, 'It would not be right for us to neglect the word of God so as to give out food; you, brothers, must select from among yourselves seven men of good reputation, filled with the Spirit and with wisdom; we will hand over this duty to them, and continue to devote ourselves to prayer and to the service of the word.' The whole assembly approved of this proposal and elected Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit, together with Philip, Prochorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicolaus of Antioch, a convert to Judaism. They presented these to the apostles, who prayed and laid their hands on them.

The word of the Lord continued to spread: the number of disciples in Jerusalem was greatly increased, and a large group of priests made their submission to the faith.

A reading from the first letter of St Peter

You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood.

The Lord is the living stone, rejected by men but chosen by God and precious to him; set yourselves close to him so that you too, the holy priesthood that offers the spiritual sacrifices which Jesus Christ has made acceptable to God, may be living stones making a spiritual house. As scripture says: See how I lay in Zion a precious cornerstone that I have chosen and the man who rests his trust on it will not be disappointed. That means that for you who are believers, it is precious; but for unbelievers, the stone rejected by the builders has proved to be the keystone, a stone to stumble over, a

rock to bring men down. They stumble over it because they do not believe in the word; it was the fate in store for them.

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a consecrated nation, a people set apart to sing the praises of God who called you out of the darkness into his wonderful light.

The words I say to you I do not speak as from myself:


it is the Father, living in me, who is doing this work.

The Gospel of the Lord.



Reflection by Greg Sunter

The gospel readings for this week and next week shift the focus away from the resurrection and begin to set us up for the departure of Jesus from the earth - the Ascension - and the sending of the Holy Spirit - the Pentecost event.

Today's gospel passage comes from the very long Last Supper discourse in the gospel of John. When Jesus speaks about 'going away' for a time it could be interpreted as the period of his death and rising that are about to occur in the chronology of the story. However, the gospel of John is written a very long time after the death of Jesus; perhaps as much as 70 years after Jesus. Given this period of time between the events and the writing, we know that the writer was also referring to this longer time of Jesus 'going away'. By the time of the writing of this gospel the early Christians were starting to come to terms with the fact that Jesus probably wasn't going to return in their lifetime. They had seen the devastating destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple by the Romans in 70CE which they thought had signalled the end of all time. However, here they were, still alive and still no sign of Jesus' return.

The theme of being present and being absent is very strong in this gospel. The discussion about Jesus and the Father being one is part of this theme. Jesus is God present in the world. God has come to dwell among the people. When Jesus speaks of preparing rooms in the Father's house, it is a reference to preparing the disciples to 'live' in God; to dwell in God just as God has dwelt in the people.

Community Gathering on Child Sexual Abuse

Professor Caroline Taylor AM will lead a public gathering in St Mary's Parish, Dunworth Centre, on Tuesday, 20 May at 7.00pm, addressing issues surrounding child sexual abuse. All from our Hamilton extended community are welcome. The gathering is designed to help create community awareness around the prevalence of child sexual abuse and its impact on victims.

She will also conduct a similar workshop in the afternoon with teachers from our schools. Caroline recently led similar workshops in Warrnambool and Ballarat where the participants were deeply touched by her presentation and appreciative of her wisdom and courage in addressing this field.

Caroline is recognised as one of Australia's leading experts in the field of child and adult sexual violence and domestic violence and the criminal justice response to victim/survivors and social models of trauma and recovery. She has also worked extensively internationally. Her work has been cited to support law reform in a number of Australian jurisdictions and her work, advocacy and influence in the area of sexual violence, child abuse and domestic violence has helped many people.

Catholic Church Agencies react to Budget

THE 2014-15 Federal Budget's widespread cuts to welfare, health, education and foreign aid have drawn sharp criticism from key national and state Catholic agencies.

The cuts include changes to family benefits, resuming fuel excise increases, a \$7 health-care co-payment for GP visits and an estimated \$7.6 billion decrease in foreign aid funding over the next five years.

Federal Treasurer Joe Hockey, announcing his first budget, told parliament the Government's economic action strategy was about "spending less on consumption and more on investment so we can keep making decent, compassionate choices in the future".

Australian business particularly welcomed the proposed 1.5 percentage point cut to the company tax rate. The Business Council of Australia said the budget would "lay the foundations for a stronger future".

St Vincent de Paul Society chief executive Dr John Falzon said the budget contained measures "that rip the guts out of what remains of a fair and egalitarian Australia".

"These measures will not help people into jobs but they will force people into deeper poverty," he said.

National Catholic Education Commission executive director Ross Fox welcomed funding certainty contained in the budget through to the end of the 2017 school year.

"However, based on recent experience, the school funding assumptions contained in the Federal Budget for 2018 and beyond will not meet the needs of schools and students," he said.

"In the last decade the CPI has averaged less than 3 per cent.

"This contrasts with school funding increases reflecting real costs in schools of almost 5.5 per cent."

Catholic Health Australia chief executive officer Martin Laverty said ongoing monitoring of the new \$7 health-care co-payments for GP visits, pathology and diagnostic imaging would be needed to avoid a drop in health-care outcomes. "Those with capacity to contribute to their health-care costs should do so," he said.

"Those less able to contribute must be guaranteed high-quality access to health care when needed, with the support of a robust, publicly funded social safety net."

Reforms to the pension have been delayed until the next parliamentary term, to keep Tony Abbott's election promise of no change to pensions.

Caritas Australia is disappointed to see the Government abandon its responsibilities as a global leader and further damage Australia's reputation as a generous nation. Cutting almost \$8 billion from Australia's Overseas Development Assistance (ODA) in Tuesday's budget, the Australian Government is backing further away from its pre-election promises and our nation's commitments to the international community. Though Australia is one of the wealthiest countries in the world our aid budget is currently ranked 13th out of the world's 24 richest nations. In a sidestep away from the world's leading countries, Australia has dropped the internationally recognized measurement of aid commitments in proportion to a country's income, and capped aid spending at \$5 billion for the next two years, and CPI thereafter.

Caritas is pleased that the government ANCP partnership program is set to continue and looks forward to receiving the government's aid policy framework and performance benchmarks in the coming weeks. This long-term government partnership, in 2012-13 alone, allowed Caritas Australia to reach more than 2.1 million people. Caritas looks forward to partnering with government to ensure that Australian investments in economic growth and trade relations enable the world's poorest access to improved security and prosperity.

The Government will index pensions, including the age pension and the disability support pension, to inflation rather than wages, which is the higher measure, from September 2017.
